WELCOME MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

I am delighted to welcome you to the first issue of the ASST newsletter. As the Chair of the Board, it is an honour to share with you the incredible progress and achievements our organization has made, thanks to the unwavering dedication of our staff, volunteers, and supporters like you.

This newsletter marks a new chapter in our journey to provide support, advocacy, and hope to asylum seekers and refugees. It will serve as a platform to highlight our collective efforts, share stories of resilience and success, and keep you informed about our ongoing projects and upcoming events.

At ASST, our mission is to create a welcoming and inclusive environment for those seeking safety and a new beginning in Aotearoa. I would like to highlight the recent law reform regarding the detention of mass arrivals. This reform, unfortunately, has been accompanied by negative political and media discourses, creating an unwelcoming and stigmatizing environment for asylum seekers.

We are also concerned that while the government has moved quickly to reform the law on the detention of mass arrivals, it has not addressed the aspect of the law that involves the use of police cells and prisons for detaining asylum seekers who arrive individually. This oversight continues to affect the treatment and perception of individual asylum seekers. While the government has funded ASST (for the first time from 2023 to 2025) to provide critical support to asylum seekers in accessing welfare and other essential services, we're still experiencing systemic problems at MSD and IRD which are leaving some in the community struggling to access their basic needs. We're also troubled with the hardships we're seeing from homelessness amongst asylum seekers in Aotearoa.

We hope this newsletter will not only inform you but also inspire you to continue supporting our cause. Together, we can make a significant difference in the lives of those who need it most.

Thank you for being a part of the ASST community. We look forward to sharing our journey with you and achieving even greater milestones together.

Each week, the Asylum Seekers Support Trust (ASST) distributes approximately 150 food boxes, providing essential nourishment to 500-600 individuals and families. Our old van was becoming costly to upkeep and unreliable, making it difficult to sustain our vital services.

We went to our donors, Hugo Charitable Trust and Foundation North, explaining this critical need for a reliable and efficient car. Both put their resources together and purchased a brand new KIA Carnival 2.2 EX Diesel for ASST worth \$50,000". This will go a long way and for many years in helping ASST move clients around to appointments and the delivery of food boxes.

On May 22nd, we received the vehicle from KIA Newmarket, with Mr. Raj handing over the keys. A big thank you to Luke from the Otago branch and Raj from the Newmarket KIA branch for facilitating the process smoothly.

ASST GROWS IN STAFF TO MEET INCREASING DEMAND

The Asylum Seeker Support Trust (ASST) is pleased to announce the expansion of our dedicated team. We now have **8 full-time staff members**, 1 part-time staff member, and a driver working 10 hours a week. This growth reflects our ongoing commitment to providing comprehensive support to our community.

Our client numbers have reached an impressive **1,904**, demonstrating the increasing demand for our services. In response, our team has been working tirelessly, with last month alone seeing **1,700** activities and the delivery of **499** food parcels.

This expansion in staff allows us to better serve our clients and continue our mission of supporting asylum seekers and refugees with the utmost care and professionalism. We are grateful for the continued support of our community and partners, which makes this growth possible.

Asylum Seekers Support Trust is the only NGO that truly understands and empathizes with the experience of being a refugee. The support and care they provide brings tears to my eyes when I think about how my life would be a disaster if I hadn't found this organization.
