RECORD NEW CLIENTS

Our client services team has been handling a steady increase if new arrival asylum seekers, with an increasing need for emergency and essential needs such as resolving homelessness, need for food Parcels, warm clothes, support with writing visa applications, and accessing income. In the month of November, we saw a record of 142 new referrals come to ASST. This large number of new clients, as well as our existing clients are handled by such a small client services team. I am very proud of our incredible staff, who strive to support each and every asylum seeker with dignity, respect and empathy.

DELAYS IN CLAIM LETTERS

Daily we are seeing the negative impact of the delays with Confirmation of Claim letters being issued for refugee claimants. Many asylum seekers are waiting a month or longer after submitting their refugee claim, to receive this letter, that proves they are in the refugee process. Unfortunately, asylum seekers cannot access basic care or resources without this document. We are seeing adults and children unable to access basic or emergency healthcare, unable to receive welfare assistance, and delays in children being able to attend school. This issue also exacerbates the homelessness issue faced by so many asylum seekers currently, as there is no income source to resolve homelessness.

Asylum Seekers Support Trust (ASST) is an incredible team of people with huge hearts for helping others! Seeking asylum is a specialised need and trying to navigate it out on your own while trying to provide for your family in a foreign land is an extremely difficult task. My family had already been turned away several times for assistance with other organisations and this caused me anxiety and loneliness. My first contact with ASST was immediately uplifting - to have someone respond back quickly, to recognise our circumstances and to experience empathy from a stranger was good for my soul. I knew someone cared about us; that was priceless.

My first meeting was with Shilear, a Senior Social Worker, and I knew immediately that she was there to help me. I didn't have to defend myself again about our circumstances because Shilear was already on my side. It was really encouraging to not have to beg for help, to have help offered freely with compassion. I was grateful for the time she spent with me and her immediate offer of food assistance and a list of lawyers to contact. Shilear promised to follow up soon, and she did! I was added to Asylum Seekers groups for meetings, health presentations, employment information and driving practice.

My family and I were suddenly included in a diverse group of people all wanting to help each other. This was very refreshing. I had a huge issue with accessing Education for my family and was unable to get a Visa on my own, which was a huge obstacle for us to stay safely in New Zealand. Shilear, with her continual updates and checking in on me, stepped up to this difficult challenge. I must say, that I was shocked with the amazing results that Shilear so quickly achieved! She got everyone in my family a Visa from Immigration! This has vastly improved our lives, in many ways. I am so thankful that the team at Asylum Seekers Support Trust has opened their doors to people like my family who have left everything to find safety in New Zealand. From the friendly smile handing us food, to the organizers prioritizing our needs, meeting presenters empathetic to all our backgrounds and the incredible managers keeping focus on such specialized support - ASST is a Blessing!

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WORKSHOP ON ASYLUM SEEKER ENTITLEMENTS

In November 2024, ASST held a workshop focused on asylum seeker entitlements, providing an overview of the support available to asylum seekers and refugee claimants in New Zealand. Key topics included accessing Work and Income benefits, healthcare services, schooling options, English classes, and other essential information to help navigate their new environment.

CHILDREN'S WELL-BEING AND SAFETY WORKSHOP

In December 2024, ASST organised a workshop about children and invited guests from the Ministry of Education, Plunket, and Neighborhood Support to discuss important information.

The Ministry of Education covered the New Zealand education system, the importance of school attendance, supporting children's learning, including English learning.

Plunket Whānau Āwhina provided information about health services available in New Zealand, including immunisations, school options and daycare facilities, guidelines on when it is considered appropriate to leave children unattended, the importance of car seats, laws regarding physical punishment of children.

Neighborhood Support discussed important information about safety and provide information about how Neighborhood Support works with the community to enhance safety.

Testimony from a client

I left my country, Syria, in 2012 because of the revolution and the war. The situation became unbearable, and I had no choice but to flee. I moved to Turkey, but life there was not easy. In Turkey, everything was difficult— a new language, a different culture, and a new community. As a refugee, I struggled to adjust to my new life. It was hard to find my place. I faced constant anxiety, panic attacks, and depression. I was overwhelmed by negative thoughts. I also had deep concerns about my family, wondering if they were safe. During that time, there was no way to communicate with them from Syria. The silence was unbearable.

My mind was full of worries—about my future, my destiny, and my family. The pressure felt overwhelming. I constantly felt depressed and stressed, with a heavy load on my mind. On top of that, the situation for Syrians in Turkey was very difficult. The daily news from Syria was heartbreaking—violent, tragic, and filled with horror.

I tried to find work to support myself, but it was incredibly difficult. As a foreigner and a refugee, opportunities were scarce. I felt frustrated and devastated, often questioning how I would survive. I spent nearly ten years in Turkey, enduring these hardships and struggles. The events of those years felt like an endless tragedy.w chapter in my life Eventually, I came to New Zealand, hoping for a better future. Now, I face similar challenges as a refugee. However,

the community here is more welcoming, and the opportunities are greater. Yet, despite the better circumstances, I find myself struggling with something else—I've lost my confidence and my belief in my own ability to build a new life.

I am trying to adjust to my new life, but the memories of my past are difficult to let go of. I don't want to dwell on the pain I experienced, but I know that I must move forward. I hope to rebuild my life here, with the support of the government and the Kiwi community.

I am determined to overcome the challenges, regain my confidence, and find hope for the future. I believe that with time and support, I can create a ne

In 2024, the Asylum Seekers Support Trust (ASST) hosted its Annual General Meeting, bringing together over 100 attendees, including community members, stakeholders, board members, staff, and clients. This gathering celebrated a year of significant achievements, from expanding client services and hosting impactful workshops to fostering community connections through events like zoo trips and monthly dinners. The AGM was an opportunity to reflect on the year's progress, acknowledge the challenges faced, and reaffirm our shared commitment to supporting asylum seekers in New Zealand.

LAUNCH OF IMPACT EVALUATION REPORT 2024

The Asylum Seekers Support Trust (ASST) continues to make a transformative difference in the lives of asylum seekers in New Zealand. In 2024, ASST provided critical support to 1,804 individuals, addressing essential needs such as housing, food, and clothing, while also offering guidance on visas, employment, and social welfare. With a trauma-informed, needs-based approach, ASST prioritised high-need clients, enabling them to rebuild their lives with dignity.

Over 80% of surveyed clients reported that ASST had made a "huge" or "significant" difference in their lives. The 2024 Impact Report has been shared with key stakeholders, including policymakers and politicians, to highlight the importance of ASST's work and advocate for sustainable funding. With growing demand, this support is crucial to continue welcoming, supporting, and empowering asylum seekers to thrive in Aotearoa.
